

## **Children's Book Project: Checklist & Rubric**

- Children's Book Review:
  - Explore books in the library and choose one to work with.
  - Complete the Plot Mountain diagram.
  - Answer the Book Review questions.
  - Share your book with your group.
  
- Children's Book Themes:
  - Record the class brainstorm of common themes in children's literature.
  - Choose one or two themes that connect with a memory you have. Write about that memory as a journal entry, using all five senses and as much detail as possible. (You can invent details!)
  
- Your Story:
  - Details: Gathering as many details as possible (point form is fine!).
  - Plot Mountain: Identify the main points of the plot.
  - Plot Pitch: Use the template to organise your story and share with a classmate for feedback.
  - Storyboard: Work out how the story unfolds in more detail and identify what will be on each page (text and image).
  - Draft Text: Type your story's text exactly as you want it to appear in your book, using correct language rules (punctuation, spelling, etc.).
  - Character & Setting Sketch: On a single page, draw your main character and the main setting of your story. Include keywords or labels to add detail as needed.
  - Text Edit:
    - Read your story *out loud* to make sure it makes sense.
    - Peer edit
    - Revisions
    - Teacher edit
    - Revisions
    - Final edit
  - Draft Book
    - Rough outline sketch of what will be on each page.
    - Identity materials needed to complete the images (pencil crayons, computer software for comic book construction, etc.)
  - Published Book
    - Clear text and illustrations.
    - Printed and bound in a finished way of your choice.
    - About the Author section - optional.
